See our Membership Report attached given at Area 2 meeting in Laramie, WY. We offer one social each month to introduce women to Zonta Club of FC. From AUG 2013-DEC 31, 2013 we had 12 new members join our club. We have had several new members join in past month or two as well. There are several more women who are ready to join us in next month as well. We hold our orientation sessions for new members currently quarterly or more often as needed. Our next new member orientation is scheduled for TH May 8, 2014. Our Zonta Club was invited to join the Fort Collins Chamber as a Red Carpet member and our initial membership fee was split between a community business owner and one of our members. We just finished our first year and have joined again and have just begun our second year. The savings afforded our non-profit with bulk mailings for our major fundraiser has off set our chamber dues. Our membership chair also belongs to a women's networking group to market our Zonta Club. We have obtained business support and individuals who are joining Zonta due to the relationships created as we participate in these two organizations. There are three women getting ready to get started from these two organizations. We are excited that the women with their diverse backgrounds are excited to join the Zonta Club of Fort Collins. We send an occasional postcard via USPO to our members such as: Thank you for joining or as in April it was National Volunteer month so it was a thank you for being in Zonta. We initiated a new member Mentor program in 1st
guarter of 2014 and paired current members with new members alphabetically by last names.

helped prevent and fight violence against women and girls (VAW)

Our Zonta Club conducted many events this year which helped to improve the status of women. One way that our group helped to increase the economic status of women was through our ZEP (Zonta Empowerment Program), our group invited non-profit organizations throughout our region to have a free informational booth at Front Range Community College and all of the single mothers who attend Front Range Community College were invited to come and learn about the community resources available to them to assist them in achieving their goals. We provide a mentor program for single Mom's at FRCC/LC as well pairing our Zonta members with a single Mom who has requested a mentor. We also provide a scholarship to a single Mom at this time from FRCC/LC called the Arlene Davy Scholarship and it has been up to \$1000.00 per recipient.

Further service projects included our members assisting with the Junior League Closet, formally the Able Women's Closet, which provides professional clothing for women who are entering the workforce for the first time or re-entering the workforce. Our members helped to sort, press and hang clothing so that women in our community could have a professional and special shopping experience at the Closet.

Additionally, our Zonta Club participated in the Zonta Says No event. We had a poster design contest for high school students in our region and the winners were displayed at the Zonta Says No event - hung at the gallery opening and again for 30 days at a local coffee shop art gallery for viewing. The Zonta Club started the night with a flash mob dance in Old Town and then everyone attended the gallery opening at a new community art space business called 'The Downtown Artery' which was donated for our event. During the gallery presentation, **local artists read their poetry, displayed their creations and shared their experiences healing from violence. A committee judged the posters and chose winners. The event was publicized throughout the region. No one read poetry. A CSU Masters in Fine Student who participated in the ZEP mentor program worked with Single Mom's from abusive relationships to create their artwork by making paper from scratch depicting the opportunity to create something good and new out of something old and not so good. This was called the 'Mending Paper Project'. These single Moms displayed their artwork at this event. We hosted a speaker from a local church U Count, about International sex trafficking in India. We provided donations to the local Safe House for abused women. We provided a \$150 financial donation to one of our non-profit vendors, Realities for Children, who hosted an education table about what they do to support abusive women in our community. We had many organizations present. We provided a visible paper doll chain of 973 dolls to represent the number of women abused within the city limits of Fort Collins from Jan 2013 to Nov 2013.

Our Zonta Club collected the materials for birthing kits which were to help save the lives of mothers and babies around the globe. Materials were donated to the club and Patti Smith coordinated the 'Global Women's Healthcare' presentation at which many high school students created the birthing kits (2013-96 and 2014 -100). Our club partners with a local charity - Think Humanity - who delivered the kits to refugee camps in Uganda.

Finally, our Zonta Club held its 3rd annual Meet the Author event whereby three local authors shared their works with more than 100 women at the Country Club in Fort Collins. Many local women owned businesses held vendor tables at the event and our Zonta Club marketed the club as well to increase membership. Presenters included Dr. Joan King presenting 'A Life on Purpose', Kari Grady Grossman presenting 'Bones that Float' about schools she built in Cambodia for girls, and Victoria Ames presenting 'I Can Dance Too.'

We received visibility on our Facebook Page, our website, in our newsletter, from the banners we hung up in downtown Fort Collins, the coverage by a photographer, article in SW Fort Collins Magazine and all of the emails we sent our contact lists.

(e) sustainability of the project (long lasting results, and could the project continue for a certain period of time)

The Junior League Closet project is extremely sustainable because the women who receive clothing from the organization receive a job which sets their life on a new trajectory and path forever.

The ZEP event has no formal evaluation process for its attendees, but we anticipate that all participants are impacted and receive resources in the community that they may otherwise not have.

The Zonta Says No event was an advocacy and educational event that we hope will make a lasting impact on the attendees.

The Meet the Author event will have long lasting impact on its attendees who read the books presented by the authors, you cannot help but be changed positively when influenced by powerful pieces of writing.

The Birthing Kits are changing the course of history - human beings who may not have lived without access to these birthing kits are now given the gift of life due to those who collected supplies, built the kits and then shipped them to the recipients.

Describe your club's Zonta Says No activities in 2013 - 2014:

2nd annual city council Mayoral proclamation in Nov 2013 RE: '16 days of activism ending violence against women' project.

We created a partnership with Cynarra Tweed, the CSU Women's Gender Dept Education Coordinator and together we offered to the community a showing of the Documentary 'Saving Face' that won a 2012 Oscar. We hosted an education event NOV 25, 2013 in Old Town Fort Collins. We began with a Flash Mob dance to the music: Break the Chain. We invited 15 high school art classes to participate in a poster contest around the theme: 'Zonta Says No'. We had three art classes participate from three different high schools and that was 20 student posters from 8th grade to 12th grade. The posters are on our FB page. We gave out (3) three financial awards and (3) honorable mention awards. We were offered a free space to host our indoor education event in a new community art business space. We had numerous posters about Zonta and our local projects in the initial hallway, we had our 20 high school posters in the gallery and we had two other non-profits bring their participants work to show as well. One was Mending Paper Project initiated by one of our Single Moms who was in our Mentor program. Rachael is a CSU Masters in Fine Art student and she wrote a grant to work with single Mom's in abusive and/or challenging relationships to create paper from scratch out of old blue jeans and more. They created betuty out of something old and ugly. They displayed their wonderful art projects. One of our members met with the Fort Collins Police Detective of Personal Crimes and found out that there were 973 abuse cases against women in the city limits of FC from Jan 2013 to NOV 2013. We cut out 973 paper dolls and put them up around the room to show our guests how many women that represented. This was only cases that had been investigated, not including all reported and of course, those not reported. We had a speaker about Sex Trafficking work done in India by U Count from Timberline Church. We had about 60+ community members who attended. We had gifted graphic design work, desserts for our guests and of course, the art space. We also completed a project to donate numerous baby items to our Crossroads Safe House in FC as well. We sold tickets on door prize baskets and gave that money to one of the non-profit vendors, Realities For Children, that came to help educate the public

about the services they offer in our community. In NOV 2013 we went to the City Council and had a proclamation signed about ending violence against women. We had numerous articles etc. in our local newspaper as well.
