1. Each year, we host two CLIMB Wyoming Graduations. The first was in the Fall of 2013 and had approximately 10% club participation. The next ceremony is in June of 2014. We have been working with CLIMB for several years now.

2. We have a clothing closet called "Suited for Success" which houses professional clothing for women in need. The clothing may be used for job interviews, or the client may take multiple outfits to ensure proper professional dress for those first several weeks on the job. Clothing which is donated and cannot be utilized in the closet is placed on consignment at Nu2u which generated approximately \$200 this year to aid in Club operations. A committee predominantly handled the Suited for Success Closet and committee members are available by appointment to help clients choose professional clothing. Our clients are generally from the CLIMB Wyoming program and the SAFE Project but we have received several direct referrals from Laramie citizens throughout the years.

- The Zonta Club of Laramie spent the year trying to raise awareness within its club, so that club members could be more comfortable and motivated to raising awareness within the community. We did this by bringing in speakers to discuss three specific topics. These topics included domestic violence against women, sexual assault and women's health. These awareness activities fall under the improving the status of women in general category. The club devoted three monthly meetings to awareness. The October meeting focused on domestic violence, the February meeting was devoted to sexual assault and the March meeting focused on women's mind and body health. Advocates well versed in the three topics came in and discussed examples from the Laramie community, they also stated the local statistics. This made the issues more transparent and urgent to our club members because many of the examples shared were personal and brought to light many of the issues women in the community are facing.

Over the course the three months the club involvement would be near 100%. The Zonta Club of Laramie partnered with the Laramie SAFE Project, Ivinson Memorial Hospital and the Mind, Body & Wellness Center.

The visibility and credibility to Zonta was seen throughout the year in the amount of involvement that took place. With each of the presentations we also had side projects that dealt with many of these issues that had been discussed. For example we collected many overnight products, such as shampoo, soaps, feminine products, pajamas, toiletries, small bags and a change of clothes for the Laramie SAFE project. These items went to those women who left their homes with nothing and needed a few items to hold them over for a few days while they were traveling. The entire club gathered and donated enough items to help 500 women in their first two nights of transition. The club awareness that took place really helped motivate the members to ask for donation or to donate themselves. This section of the advocacy project really relates more to the help prevent and fight violence against women and girls.

Yes, this project reflects one of the District 12 Platforms for advocacy. We are directly supporting measures to oppose gender based violence by helping SAFE victims. We are also raising awareness in domestic violence and sexual assault.

2. The Zonta Club of Laramie participated in the Candlelight Vigil that takes place in October. Each year the Club helps with refreshments, attendance and advertising of the Candlelight Vigil. Members of the community are asked to come light a candle to remember those who have lost their lives to domestic violence in Albany County. We are there to advocate and support those who are working to end violence in their own lives and those who have lost loved ones. This event falls under the category to help prevent and fight violence against women and girls. It also follows the supporting measures to oppose gender based violence in domestic violence. We had about 45% club involvement in this activity and it was partnered with the Laramie SAFE project and the Laramie Soroptimist group. Many picture from this event were posted to the Zonta Club of Laramie's Facebook page to raise further awareness of the domestic violence problems happening right here in Laramie.

Zonta Says No:

Describe your club's Zonta Says No activities in 2013 - 2014:

In November the Zonta Club of Laramie held a free, three hour self-defense class for women in the Laramie community to raise awareness about the Zonta Says No campaign. The course taught women to focus on the situations they are in and to use their own judgment to determine if they need to remove themselves from that situation. They were also taught easy to use self-defense moves to get them away from their attacker. During this class they were given a Zonta Say No Brochure listing important information about violence against women. This class reached 30 women in the community and was advertised in the local High School. The course and its message were shared on Facebook. Also, for the week of November 25 every club member who has a Facebook page changed their photo to an orange block and their cover photo to the Zonta Says No logo. We spent the time to teach the members how to share these photos so that they would reach thousands of people on Facebook. Lastly, club members passed around orange ribbons and Zonta Says No brochures to downtown business.

agreed to gather the materials needed while the Z Club agreed to sew. They are currently working with Girl Talk to bring the program into the Junior High. The ladies' school year has ended, however the girls continue to recruit for next year.
