- 1. The Delores Project: We provide and serve dinner to 55-70 homeless women on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of each month. Category: Health Participation: 56% Sustainability: The project has been on-going for 8 years.
- 2. Open Door Ministries Reading Night: Members purchased and donated books for preschool-aged children. Members read the books they purchased to individual children before their bedtime. Category: Educational Participation: 18% Sustainability: Could be sustained indefinitely, if desired.
- 3. The Haven Christmas Party: Members provided dinner and donated a Christmas tree and decorations for the residents. Category: Health
  - Participation: 68% Sustainability: Could be sustained indefinitely, if desired.
- 4. VOA Homeless Women Vets: Collected calendar/planners at the November meeting. Category: Professional Participation: 50% Sustainability: Could be sustained indefinitely, if desired.
- 5. Work Options for Women (WOW): We donated 64 white t-shirts and 14 packages of Sharpies for the women enrolled in the Food Safe Program. Category: Economic Participation: 40% Sustainability: Could be sustained indefinitely, if desired
- 6. Smart Girl: Members helped stuff backpacks and volunteered on STEM GIRL day on Feb. 22. Category: Educational Participation: 10% Sustainability: Could be sustained indefinitely, if desired

- 7. The Haven: Our club responded to an emergency call for undergarments by providing 59 bras, 153 panties, and 40 pairs of socks for the residents. Category: Health Participation: 56% Sustainability: Could be sustained indefinitely, if desired
- 8. Denver Santa Claus Shop: December: Members volunteer in the gathering, preparing, displaying and "shopping."
  Approximately 16,000 toys have been collected and distributed to needy families within Denver since 1931.
  Category: Economic Participation: 20% Sustainability: Could be sustained indefinitely, if desired
- 9. Monthly Collections: Each month we have an Item of the Month collection for our grant recipients. The following items were collected:

- 1. Zonta Club of Denver participated in the Human Trafficking Advocacy & Awareness Day at the Colorado Capitol, sponsored by the Human Trafficking Task Force of Southern Colorado. Members volunteered and/or attended the Rally at the West Steps (held in the old Supreme Court Chambers due to weather). The purpose of the event is to raise awareness of human trafficking among legislators and the public. As such it coincides with the above definition of advocacy and reflects the District 12 Platform for Advocacy issue "Supporting measures to oppose gender based violence such as trafficking, rape & domestic violence." Ten percent of club members participated. Local law enforcement were partners with the Human Trafficking Task Force of Southern Colorado as speakers at the event included the Colorado Attorney General, Denver Chief of Police, and top federal law enforcement officials, as well as members of the Colorado legislature.
- 2. Zonta Club of Denver was a sponsor of the 2014 Colorado Women's Legislative Breakfast. This event provides a platform for female members of the Colorado legislature to talk about issues of concern to them and for interested attendees to network with the legislators and with each other. It is not focused on a single issue and therefore has a broader scope than the above definition of advocacy and the District 12 Platform for Advocacy issues. Ten percent of club members participated. The event is planned by a committee including representatives of 9to5 Colorado, AAUW Colorado, Denver Commission on Aging, Colorado Center on Law & Policy, COLOR, NARAL, National Council of Jewish Women-Colorado, Colorado Women's Bar Assn, Project WISE, and Women's Lobby of Colorado. Other "community partners" included a wide array of organizations too numerous to list here. Information about Zonta was included in attendees' packets.

# **Zonta Says No:**

Describe your club's Zonta Says No activities in 2013 - 2014:

With five other Area 3 clubs, Zonta Club of Denver helped develop and present a "Zonta Says No" Art Show, Sale and Reception, held in downtown Denver on November 25, 2013, and featuring more than 100 pieces of donated art. Much of the art was produced for the show and was created by victims or advocates or focused on the theme of ending violence against women. The Reception featured displays and information from local organizations that educate the community about gender violence. The sale of art and donations for refreshments generated funds that were divided among the participating clubs and re-invested in local projects of the clubs' choosing that address gender violence. An accompanying display of dozens of pairs of donated shoes illustrated the numbers and diversity of the women who are traumatized, injured, disfigured and killed by gender-based violence every year in Colorado. After the event, the shoes were returned to victims' families as requested or donated to local charities for re-use.
