A 2014 study based on interviews with 42,000 women across the 28 Member States of the European Union revealed that only **14 percent** of women reported their most serious incident of intimate partner violence to the police, and **13 percent** reported their most serious incident of non-partner violence to the police.

Worldwide, more than **700 million** women alive today were married as children (below 18 years of age). More than one in three—or some **250 million**—were married before 15. Child brides are often unable to effectively negotiate safer sex, leaving themselves vulnerable to sexually transmitted infections, including HIV, along with early pregnancy. The fact that girls are not physically mature enough to give birth, places both mothers and their babies at risk. Poor girls are also 2.5 times more likely to marry in childhood than those living in the wealthiest quintile.

Among ever-married girls, current and/or former intimate partners are the most commonly reported perpetrators of physical violence in all the countries with available data.

Around **120 million** girls worldwide (slightly more than 1 in 10) have experienced forced intercourse or other forced sexual acts at some point in their lives.

More than **133 million** girls and women have experienced some form of female genital mutilation (FGM) in the 29 countries in Africa and the Middle East where the harmful practice is most common. Beyond extreme physical and psychological pain, girls who undergo FGM are at risk of prolonged bleeding, infection (including HIV), infertility, complications during pregnancy and death.

Nearly **55 percent** of the estimated 21 million victims of forced labor worldwide are represented by women and girls.

Women in urban areas are **twice as likely** as men to experience violence, particularly in developing countries.

Research conducted in different countries has documented associations between HIV and physical and/or sexual violence, both as a risk factor for HIV infection and as a potential consequence of being identified as living with HIV. A decade of cross-sectional research from African countries, including Rwanda, Tanzania, South Africa and more recently, India, has consistently found women who have experienced partner violence to be more likely to be infected with HIV.
