Coloado Creates Office for Missing and Murdered Indigenous People

Colorado has created an office to address the crisis of missing and murdered Indigenous people in Colorado within the Colorado Department of Public Safety.

Indigenous women in particular face heightened rates of violence, advocates and researchers say. Those crimes are too often not properly tracked or understood. The murder rate of Indigenous women is three times that of white women; more than half of Indigenous women experience sexual violence in their lifetime, and 96% of victims face it from non-Indigenous people, according to the National Congress of American Indians. When Indigenous women go missing, the disappearances are not always properly tracked or investigated, advocates say.

USA Caucus Statement on Roe vs Wade

The Zonta USA Caucus is deeply disturbed by the recently leaked draft opinion of the Supreme Court of the United States, which would overturn the settled case law, Roe v. Wade.

If this decision and rationale is ultimately issued by the Supreme Court, it would represent a break with established precedent impacting all women in the USA and would bode poorly for the protection of other rights currently guaranteed in our Constitution.

Zonta International believes every person should have the freedom to make decisions about their bodies and to safely and privately access all healthcare.

In order to keep its promise of ensuring that women have access to sexual and reproductive health and reproductive rights under UN Sustainable Development Goal #5, the US must not turn the clock back by overturning the Roe v. Wade decision. Goal #5 *Gender Equality*, expressly states that women must have access to sexual and reproductive health and reproductive rights.

By issuing this ruling, the Supreme Court would once again establish a state's right to discriminate against all women and perpetuate inequality among women who can afford access to healthcare and those that cannot.

The Zonta USA Caucus deplores the rescission of rights held by women in the United States for more than a generation. Congress should now take action to expressly codify into law the rights obtained in Roe v. Wade.

Z Club Celebrates 10 Years of Advocacy (from an article in the Boulder, CO Newspaper)



When the Zonta Foothills Club of Boulder County approached Boulder High teacher Michelle Carpenter about starting a high school chapter, she wasn't sure how the idea for the club would turn out. But Carpenter, a Spanish teacher, agreed to take a chance and sponsor the new Z Club. In fall 2012, she joined six student members as they met to plan how to support their school and local communities through service projects and advocacy.

The Z Club was officially chartered in 2013 and celebrated its 10th anniversary last week, inducting new members and hearing from club alums. "I had no idea what this was going to be," Carpenter said. "There is this amazing, beautiful team that has formed. You have made such an impact at Boulder High and communitywide."

Along with service, the club emphasizes leadership skills and understanding issues that impact women and girls, as well as helping members explore careers and apply to college. While the club is open to all students, most Boulder High members are Latina.

In the last 10 years, the club worked with the Emergency Family Assistance Association, Safe House Progressive Alliance for Nonviolence, Moving to End Sexual Assault, The Reentry Initiative, Mother House, Share-a-Gift and Community Food Share.

The club also has been active in the prevention of violence against women. For the last eight years, the club has created a "Silent Witness" display in the Boulder High library to convey the tragedy of violence and support victims by promoting local resources.

In 2020, the group produced a video urging community members to be counted through the U.S. census. They also went door to door, delivering flyers and talking with community members about why the census was important. In 2021, the group created a school-based campaign urging fellow students to get the COVID19 vaccine.

"It's driven by the kids," Carpenter said. "They see a need and meet it." Along with service work, the club brought in speakers to talk about careers, from medicine to criminal justice to education to social work. Before the pandemic they also visited local colleges, universities and businesses. The club has a 100% graduation rate, and many graduates continue as members of the college club.

Z Club President Monce Dominguez, a junior, said the club this year focused on service projects they could do at school and bringing in virtual guest speakers. Next school year, she's looking forward to the return of field trips and projects outside the school. She added she was inspired by the stories of the club's graduates. "I want to be a part of that big Zonta community," she said.

ZONTA Women In Careers New Initiative In Zonta Pikes Peak Area



In 2019, Zonta Club of the Pikes Peak Area (Zonta PPA) introduced a new initiative entitled **ZONTA Women In Careers**

(#ZWIC). Spearheaded by Zonta PPA member Lynette Jones, this highly successful program is designed to inspire, inform and empower women and teenage girls in the Pikes Peak region and beyond!

#ZWIC is a free workshop available to audiences interested in understanding women in the careers they have chosen. Delivered either virtually or in-person, the facilitated panel-discussion format:

- Introduces participants to a variety of available career options, provides information about required education, skills, earning potential and demand for jobs in the field
- Motivates participants to explore different career possibilities
- Provides an opportunity to interact with established professionals/workers
- · Provides support and encouragement for participants' goals
- Introduces avenues for working toward self-sufficiency
- Helps participants recognize what it takes to be successful in the work arena

#ZWIC panels typically consist of a moderator and five Zonta PPA members representing a variety of business industries and career professions. It typically takes one hour: 45-50 minutes of panelists answering questions about their specific industry, sharing insights, etc., followed by 10 minutes of Q&A with the attendees.

#ZWIC received the Zonta 12th District Governor's Award in the Service category in 2019.

#ZWIC has been presented to more than 100 women and teenage girls at organizations and institutions of higher learning either in-person or virtually and has received high praise from each of them. Zonta PPA continues to be invited to present the initiative at new organizations throughout the region. Additionally, Zonta Club of Fort Collins is planning to implement a **#ZWIC** program in their community.
